As *The Hollow Men* suggests, individuals become “shape without form... gesture without motion” (Eliot), indicating the loss of authentic spiritual identity. By engaging with religious, philosophical, and literary frameworks, the paper demonstrates that Eliot's poetry is not merely descriptive but diagnostic, offering a critique of modernity's spiritual void. Ultimately, the study argues that Eliot's work continues to resonate in contemporary times, where the absence of spiritual grounding remains a defining feature of human experience.

Eliot's famous line, "This is the way the world ends / Not with a bang but a whimper," encapsulates the quiet, almost imperceptible decline of spiritual vitality. This is not a dramatic collapse but a gradual erosion of meaning. The significance of Eliot's work lies in its ability to transform individual despair into a broader cultural diagnosis. His poetry does not merely reflect personal anxiety; it reveals a collective condition of spiritual disintegration. In this regard, Eliot's work resonates with contemporary concerns about the loss of meaning in an increasingly materialistic world. Contemporary scholars, including interpretative approaches associated with Ramen Goswami, emphasize the relevance of Eliot's work to present-day society. Despite the extensive body of scholarship on Eliot, there remains a need for a comprehensive analysis that integrates historical, theoretical, and contemporary perspectives. Eliot's use of religious imagery underscores the contrast between past and present.
